



Australia and the New Technologies: Evidence Based Policy in Public Administration

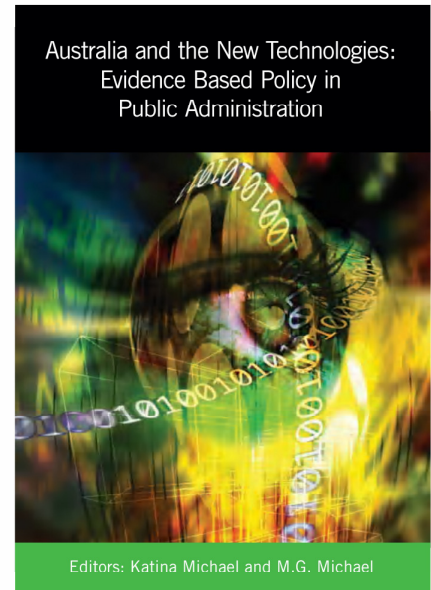
